From Barningham Growers...

You may be interested in the results of an experiment I carried out at 'Barningham Growers' to investigate the 'No-Dig' method of growing potatoes (variety Désirée).

Equal numbers of similar-sized potatoes were planted directly into the soil in four plots. The soil was not cultivated (No-Dig) but covered in layers of materials as shown. Four months later, the potatoes were harvested, cleaned and weighed.

Plot no.	Soil covering (from the soil surface upwards)	Harvest (kg)
1	No covering - this is the CONTROL	1.8
2	Newspaper, cardboard, compost	2.4
3	Hay, cardboard, compost	6.0
4	Cardboard, compost, woodchips	2.5

Conclusions:

- The control plot (no 1) with no soil coverings produced the lowest yield.
- Plots 2, 3 and 4 were all covered in cardboard and compost. Additionally, plot 2 had newspaper and plot 4 had woodchips; these produced similar increases in yield (at least 33%). Plot 3 however, in addition to the cardboard and compost, had a covering of hay. The increase in yield here was significant (over 230%).

Overall Conclusions:

It does seem that soil coverings, particularly hay, can increase the yield of potatoes. I did not set out to answer the question 'why'. The investigation needs to be 'peer reviewed' and repeated many times in different conditions to validate the results.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH: SECURING YOUR E-MAIL ACCOUNT

Your email password: using a combination of 3 random words creates passwords that are long enough and strong enough. Avoid words that can be guessed, like your pet's name or birth month. Adding numbers and symbols is a good way to make your password even harder to guess.

Turn on 2-Step Verification (2SV) for your email: 2-Step Verification (2SV) gives you twice the protection so even if cyber criminals have your password, they can't access your email. It works by asking for more information to prove your identity. For example, getting a code sent to your phone when you sign in using a new device or change settings

such as your password. You won't be asked for this every time you check your email.

To the barn and forked inside for winter keep. All the family worked to make haycocks, haypikes and havricks.

Butterflies, bees on the meadow flowers, partridge, corncrake chicks

Safely moved over, then came back to where they were In those long hay times of yesteryear.

The scythes are hung up in the hedge, forgetting where they are.

Two horses pull the iron-wheeled finger cutter bar, Its metal chatter warning all to get out of the way –

If they fail, there's a fieldmouse without a tail.

With horse machinery mown swathes were made into hay, Lifted to the barn and stacked one forkful at a time, the same old way.

The farm tractor changes this plodding horse with a new machine that it brings:

The pickup baler making hay into little bales tied with two strings.

With muscle and sweat they are manhandled and led away: The haysweep and hayfork have had their day.

On the fields now a chemical fertiliser is spread, A weedkiller spray and all the wild flowers are dead. A monoculture field of intensive grass that the old finger mower would choke

But that spinning disc mower does easily cope. From thick rows the forage harvester into trailers the grass blows

And to the clamp it goes – SILAGE.

Wilting grass is baled, big square or round, Plastic wrapped but still on the ground. Hydraulically lifted and put to a black plastic stack To make old-fashioned hay we are losing the knack. We haven't made hay; that wasn't hay time – It was sitting on a tractor – tractor time – HAYLAGE.

Not as much grass in the clamp, fewer haylage bales – leave some field for nature to rewild,

To flower meadow, butterflies, birds and bees that were there when I was a child...




Applications must:
